EMPLOYEE RESOURCE GROUPS

WHAT IS AN EMPLOYEE RESOURCE GROUP (ERG)?

Employee Resource Groups are voluntary, employee-led groups that work to foster an inclusive workplace in alignment with their organization. Traditionally, they are led by and filled with groups of employees that share a characteristic, from gender to ethnicity, lifestyle to sexuality.

ERGs at the YMCA are open to all employees, regardless of their race, gender, sexuality or type of employment. These are open to everyone as the YMCA sees the value in including all in these spaces to help build greater community and connection.

African American Employee Resource Group

Through events and talks, the African American ERG works to support African American employees of the YMCA and their families.

PRIDE Employee Resource Group

Using community outreach and more, the PRIDE ERG serves members of the LGBTQIA+ community and their allies.

People with Disabilities Employee Resource Group

The newest ERG, People with Disabilities, will provide resources and more to people with disabilities, caregivers and families.

Women's Employee Resource Group

Hosting engagement and wellness events allows the Women's ERG to provide space for staff members to connect with each other and form bonds and relationships.

Empowered Leaders Employee Resource Group

Offering talks with current YMCA leadership and external community leaders, the Empowered Leaders ERG helps provide support and guidance in the professional world.



INVESTING IN YOUTH AND FAMILY

After more than a decade of running a childcare center at the Fairport Baptist Homes, we opened the brand-new Irene Skalny Childcare Center at the Eastside Family YMCA in October following a beam signing ceremony in January. This new center is located directly within a childcare desert, where currently there is only one available childcare slot per 12 children under the age of 5. Adding available childcare opportunities in the area directly contributes to the overall economic vitality of the community, allowing parents and caregivers to enter, remain in and advance in the workforce.



In addition to the center space, building this childcare center as an addition to our Eastside Family YMCA allowed us to offer access to the pool for life-saving safety around water lessons and to our gymnasium for exercise.

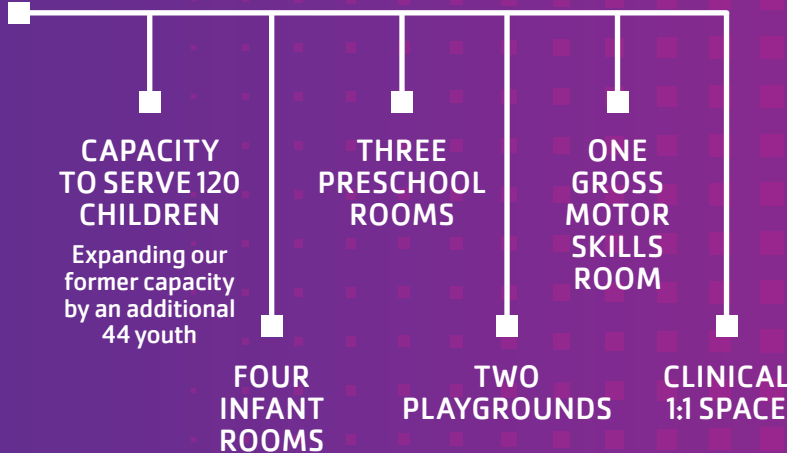

BY THE NUMBERS:



INVESTING IN

Since October of 2024, we have invested more than \$3 million into our facilities, ranging from sports courts and front desk upgrades to re-imagined spaces that better serve our communities. We are continually working to be the best we can be for our members and those we serve.

EGYM AT THE BAY VIEW AND NORTHWEST FAMILY YMCAS

Our Bay View and Northwest locations have been serving their communities for more than half a century, and every year we look to our members for feedback on ways we can invest in their needs. A direct result of their feedback was the addition of EGYM. EGYM is a circuit that takes the guesswork out of strength training, using state-of-the-art technology to track reps and weight, and make your workout fun and engaging. In August, both locations installed EGYM circuits, trained their wellness teams and began onboarding members. EGYM is currently at seven of our locations.



Nearly 1,300 MEMBERS onboarded at Bay View and Northwest in the first 90 days.

WATSON WOODS EVENT CENTER

The new Event Center at The Y at Watson Woods opened earlier this year with the annual Winter Rally for 150+ teens from the Northeast Leaders Club. This space housed a pool at the former Watson Homestead. Since filling it in, we have been able to host retreats, birthday parties and more, in addition to having a safe place for our campers to go during weather events. We also created pickleball courts in this space, allowing for year-round play for our members and greater Corning community, and added a turf area in one section for sports and games.

OUR FACILITIES



SENSORY ROOM AT THE CORNING FAMILY YMCA

In May, we opened our first-ever Sensory Room at the Corning Family YMCA. The space came from direct conversations with our members, looking for a place where they could reset. Features of our Sensory Room include:

- Tactile wall and floor
- Fidget toys
- Calming corner and controlled lighting

This room was designed with our core values in mind, providing another example of how the YMCA of Greater Rochester continues to adapt to meet the ever-changing needs of our community.

EVOLUTION OF THE LEWIS STREET YMCA NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER

Since 2001, the YMCA of Greater Rochester has been a part of the Marketview Heights neighborhood. Just as the needs of our community evolve, so do the services we offer. In 2022, the Y purchased the building, opening the first of our Neighborhood Centers. Since then, we have opened a food pantry in partnership with Foodlink, invested in new exercise equipment to open a Wellness Center, added a computer lab and, just this fall, opened Neighborhood Services in partnership with Monroe County, bringing essential services directly to the community.

The proof is in the numbers: **MORE THAN 15,000 SCANS**, doubling last year's visits.



2025 COLLABORATION FOODLINK

Past winners of this award have included regional leaders such as the United Way of Rochester and the Finger Lakes, University of Rochester Medical Center, ESL Federal Credit Union, the Sands family and more.

Foodlink has received this award once before in 2015. At that time, it was to recognize their partnership in providing kids in our before- and after-school programs with access to fresh foods and exposing them to new foods to build healthy eating habits. One of the things we admire about Foodlink is how their approach to nourishing lives continues to evolve to meet the changing needs of the community. Our partnership at The Lewis Street YMCA Neighborhood Center is an example of that evolution. YMCA Neighborhood Centers serve as community connectors, putting people we serve in touch with the services they need through Y programming and purposeful partnerships. **One of the most impactful partnerships at Lewis Street is with Foodlink.**

Foodlink worked alongside our team to add a food pantry inside the building so that when people are already at the Y, they can also access nutritious food. Thanks to this collaboration, we've been able to deliver 18,477 pounds of food, serve 11,400 meals and distribute 10,000 snacks to youth since January — which has made a significant impact on families struggling to make ends meet while grocery prices remain high.

AWARD RECIPIENT



The YMCA of Greater Rochester is pleased to recognize Foodlink as the 2025 Collaboration Award Winner. This award is only given when it is truly deserved, and Foodlink is so very deserving this year.

The food pantry at Lewis Street is just one aspect of the Foodlink and the Y partnership. Together, we are impacting lives in many ways, including:

- **CONGREGATE MEALS** – Served daily to all adults at The Thurston Road YMCA Neighborhood Center, The Lewis Street YMCA Neighborhood Center and the Maplewood Family YMCA. The Maplewood Family YMCA also hosts the Lifespan’s Lily Café Aging Resource Center where meals are served to older adults daily.
- **SUMMER MEALS** – Served daily to youth during the summer months at The Thurston Road and Lewis Street YMCA Neighborhood Centers, and this year, Power Scholars Academy at School #8 and Camp Thunderbird at Joseph C. Wilson Magnet High School.
- **MEALS FOR YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS** – Served daily to youth at The Lewis Street YMCA Neighborhood Center, Maplewood Family YMCA, Westside Family YMCA, Northwest Family YMCA, East Rochester School District, East Irondequoit Middle School, School #35, School #46 and all YMCA of Greater Rochester Full-Day Childcare Centers.
- **CURBSIDE MARKET** – Visits the Maplewood Family YMCA and the Thurston Road and Lewis Street YMCA Neighborhood Centers.

Foodlink has also generously supported many of the Y’s special events in the past – providing water and snacks for summer kickoffs, youth job fairs and baskets for families at Thanksgiving time.

That’s the thing about Foodlink: **they continue to show up and do the work necessary to ensure every person is able to feed themselves and their families with dignity.**

“It’s a natural fit for us to continue to model and rethink food access,” said Terra Keller, Chief Operating & Financial Officer of Foodlink. “The Y’s model of establishing neighborhood centers in areas hit hardest with food insecurity is an important step to ensuring access for all community members.”

Foodlink is essential to our community, and they are an essential partner of the Y. Thanks to their collaboration, the Y is providing more of our neighbors with food access than ever before in the City of Rochester. We are honored to work alongside the dedicated staff and volunteers from Foodlink and look forward to many more years of innovation and collaboration.

DAVID RIEDMAN

JURIJ Z. KUSHNER RED TRIANGLE AWARD WINNER

David, President & CEO of Riedman, has served on the Board of Directors for more than a decade, transforming and modernizing the Y during this time. He first joined the board in 2012 with a burgeoning interest in the work of the Y and quickly became a fierce advocate for our work. David's unique background, both professionally and as a community volunteer, brought a needed perspective to the organization at a time when our next great transformation and period of growth was beginning. David joined the Executive Committee, chaired the Properties Committee and would serve as Board Chair from 2023 to 2025.

David was a driving force in the expansion of the Eastside Family Branch, expansion and renovation of Camp Cory, the creation of the Schottland and Sands Family Branches as well as dozens more facility and property initiatives. The current footprint of the YMCA of Greater Rochester exists because of David's tremendous leadership, but his impact reaches far beyond our facilities. David was instrumental in guiding the Y through the challenges of COVID-19, helping our organization emerge stronger strategically, financially and in service to the community. When we welcomed our first new CEO in 25 years, he was a steady presence that ushered in a new era for the organization.

David has also made tremendous philanthropic investments throughout our Association. The Riedman name can be seen in many areas throughout our Ys, but many more spaces, programs and services have been supported with no recognition. Just as his leadership helped transform the Y, so did his and his family's generosity, serving as an inspiration for others to reach new levels in philanthropy and helped posture the Y as a leader among Rochester nonprofit agencies.

David is known as an Icon and Hall of Famer throughout the Rochester community, and now at the Y, he will forever be known as a Jurij Z. Kushner Red Triangle Award Recipient.

This award recognizes superlative contribution to the YMCA and is given only in exceptional circumstances of service and is the greatest honor given by the YMCA of Greater Rochester.



ADVOCACY WORK

The YMCA of Greater Rochester works closely with a wide variety of partners across our community to strengthen our impact each year. This year, we increased our focus on enhancing relationships with elected officials at all levels.

Through visits to Albany and Washington, DC to participate in Advocacy Days and individual meetings and tours with elected officials at our many service areas, we ensured our leaders were aware of the top priorities of the Y and the top needs in our community.

This work resulted in enhanced advocacy and financial support for the Y's mission. Some key accomplishments included:

DEVELOPING LEADERSHIP SKILLS AND FOSTERING CONNECTIONS THROUGH ESPORTS:

Assemblymember Demond Meeks visited the new EGaming Lounge at the Maplewood Family YMCA and secured funding to enhance program offerings that foster skill development, teamwork and digital literacy for youth.

ADDRESSING A CHILDCARE DESERT:

With just one childcare slot for every 12 children under 5, Penfield faces a critical need. Funding from Assemblymember Jen Lunsford and Empire State Development is helping us meet it with a new childcare center at our Eastside Family Branch—strengthening families, the workforce and our community. Senator Samra Brouk also provided funding to support youth and families at the Eastside Family YMCA.

PROVIDING MORE OVERNIGHT CAMPING EXPERIENCES FOR YOUTH:

Senator Jeremy Cooney and New York State provided support for Camp Gorham, with an emphasis on providing no-cost overnight camp experiences to children of active-duty military families. This support helped more kids in military families have the opportunity to explore the wonders of camp.

IMPROVING FACILITIES TO SERVE MORE KIDS AT DAY CAMP:

Assemblymember Josh Jensen visited YMCA Camp Northpoint and saw firsthand the impact of having limited shelters and coverings that are available during weather events such as thunderstorms, excessive rain or excessive heat. An investment was made to support the addition of outdoor structures that will allow us to serve more children every week of the summer.

MAKING WAVES: CREATING SAFE SWIMMERS & RECORD ATTENDANCE

As America's Swim Instructor, we have a focus on teaching people of all ages to be safe in and around the water. In addition to providing free lessons to children across multiple community partnerships, we were able to provide nearly **100 ADULTS WITH FREE LESSONS** thanks to a grant from The YMCA of the USA. In addition to adult swim lessons, almost **450 YOUTH RECEIVED SWIM LESSONS** at the Maplewood Family YMCA. According to the CDC, more than half of adults in the U.S. have never taken a formal swim lesson.

"People think swimming is just being able to go back and forth in the pool doing laps, but it's more than that," said Omar Hidalgo-Rojas, Aquatics Director at the Maplewood Family YMCA. "Being comfortable in and around the water will help you enjoy the positive qualities that swimming has to offer, like being able to do water exercises that are not too hard on your body or being able to enjoy your time in open water or the pool while you are on vacation with family and friends. And at the Y, we believe everybody should be able to enjoy these moments."

This summer was a busy one across our pools. We saw record scans across our three Outdoor Swim Centers - nearly **18,400 SCANS** across Camp Arrowhead, Camp Bay View and Camp Northpoint.

LIVING HISTORY COMES TO ROCHESTER

In 1963, in Birmingham, AL, four girls were killed in the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church after several KKK members planted 19 sticks of dynamite outside of the church's basement. One 12-year-old girl survived, and her name is Sarah Collins Rudolph.

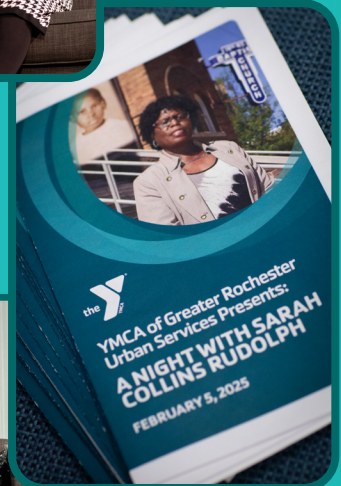
Sarah spent two months in the hospital and was left blind in one eye. It took some time for her to be able to talk about the day she became the "fifth little girl;" but now six decades later, she shares her story and the story of the four girls killed, including her sister, across the country.

In February, Collins Rudolph brought her story to Rochester thanks to our Urban Services leadership staff and board. This free event was open to the community.

GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT



In 2025, three staff members and our Corporate Board Chair represented the YMCA of Greater Rochester in South Africa as part of the Y-USA South African Coalition. Alongside more than 20 peers from seven other YMCAs across the United States, our leaders engaged in collaborative learning to better understand the transformative impact YMCAs have on communities throughout South Africa and the challenges they face. Through hands-on initiatives, such as distributing shoes to school-age children and supporting arts and music programs that enrich lives, the team strengthened cultural awareness and leadership capacity.

This coalition fosters meaningful peer networks that enable mentorship, knowledge sharing and financial resource exchange, boosting the collective influence of YMCAs worldwide. These efforts reflect our commitment to equity, global citizenship and community-centered solutions, ensuring that our Global Services align with our mission to strengthen communities both locally and globally.
